

MEET MATT BRINKLEY Research Staff Member, Science and Technology Division

How would you describe quantum information science?

A combination of quantum mechanics and information theory, the primary focus of quantum information science (QIS) rests on the application of quantum mechanics to information processing, storage, transmission and retrieval. QIS draws from a number of disciplines, such as physics, computer science, electrical engineering and information theory.

What are the implications of QIS for national security and scientific advancement?

QIS could have profound ramifications for defense and science alike, leading to sensors with unprecedented sensitivity, more practical ultraprecise clocks, and computational platforms capable of certain calculations and simulations unachievable on classical computers. For additional information, refer to "Future Directions in Quantum Information Science: A Joint Workshop Between the United States and Australia," a recent report prepared by IDA in conjunction with leading figures in QIS research.

How does the Potomac Yard facility support your needs on a day-to-day basis?

The layout of the Potomac Yard facility encourages human interaction, prompting me to form several valuable collaborations. I also rely heavily on the facility's computational resources and networks for research and sponsor communications.



What's next for the Science and Technology Division in QIS?

The government relies on IDA's Science and Technology
Division for QIS-centered research, strategic direction and
programmatic guidance. Given the mounting worldwide
interest in quantum technologies and capabilities, I anticipate
that this need will only intensify and expand in the coming
years.

MEET TYLER MORGAN-WALL

Research Staff Member, Operational Evaluation

Division

How would you describe data visualization?

Data visualization is the process of transforming information into a graphical format to help people analyze and draw insights from it more easily. This involves mapping data to visual concepts such as points, lines and colors, and using those concepts to convey complex results in a clear and understandable way.

How is data visualization used to communicate information?

Our world is awash with data: we have the ability to gather massive quantities of information but it can be hard to draw insights from such large data sets. Even when talented researchers can analyze and understand the data, they then need to distill that knowledge into a format that can be understood by nonexperts. The human mind is incredibly adept at finding patterns within complex fields of visual information, and data visualization is a way to translate abstract numerical results into a visual language our minds are better equipped to understand. Data visualization helps stakeholders develop a deeper understanding of complex results, ultimately empowering them to make more informed decisions.

How does the Potomac Yard facility support your needs on a day-to-day basis?

The large conference rooms, unclassified V-rooms and multiple SVTC [secure video teleconferencing] facilities have greatly improved my ability to work with our government partners and other members of the test community. The Potomac Yard facility's beautiful outdoor spaces and location within a vibrant and growing neighborhood make it a joy to come into the office.



Tell us about design of experiments and how it's used to inform decision makers.

Operational testing is conducted in a resource-constrained environment: we don't have unlimited time or resources to execute tests. Thus, we need a methodology to maximize the amount of information we get from each taxpayer dollar spent on testing. Design of experiments provides an analytical framework to generate designs that balance risk and resources, and then evaluate the adequacy of those designs given the goals of the test program. Using design of experiments methods and tools, testers can provide decision-makers with an objective assessment of a test program before any data is collected or money is spent.

Morgan-Wall explains how data visualization helps people better represent and understand information, and he references the R package skpr in an <u>Eye on IDA video</u>.

DIVE INTO DATA VISUALIZATION

Working groups have been established at IDA with members from across the Systems and Analyses Center and the Science and Technology Policy Institute. These working groups are focused on specific topics of strategic importance to our sponsors and IDA. For example, the Data Analytics Working Group (DAWG) was formed in February 2018 to advance the state of the art in data analytics across IDA. The working group's members include data analysts from across IDA's diverse areas of research to promote cross-collaboration and share newly developed skills.


To boost external engagement, the DAWG hosted a series of half-day forums at IDA's Potomac Yard facility. Speakers from industry, government, academia and IDA addressed analytics topics at a level accessible to a broad audience and provided venues for networking and sharing ideas.

The DAWG's second mission area is to increase collaboration and innovation in analytics internally across IDA's different

research components. The DAWG hosted an inaugural data visualization contest open to all IDA staff in 2021. This competition allowed the IDA community to learn from each other as well as improve their skills in data visualization — a crucial component to sharing our innovative work both within IDA and with our government sponsors. Contestants entered a total of 23 submissions. Tyler Morgan-Wall was the winner of the contest. View all 2021 contest <u>submissions</u>. Members of the DAWG have also formed teams to compete in data science competitions hosted by Kaggle to learn about new areas like using machine learning to recognize images. A team of DAWG members finished in 246th place out of 1,499 teams in a pneumonia-detection challenge.

MEET LUKE KNAPP

Senior Manager of Corporate Real Estate

What are your primary responsibilities?

I am responsible for managing IDA's real property assets. Under the umbrella of this broad role is real estate portfolio planning, lease negotiation and administration, facilities subcontracts and administration, and maintenance and repairs, to name just a few.

I help manage properties in four other IDA locations outside Alexandria, Virginia: Washington, D.C.; Bowie, Maryland; Princeton, New Jersey; and La Jolla, California. IDA owns some of these properties and leases land or space for others. While facilities-related matters at each of these other locations are handled by excellent dedicated staff locally, I oversee and coordinate efforts at a corporate level on behalf of all IDA components. This means assessing business needs, aligning capabilities, optimizing technology, gauging facility risk, and managing sustainability and energy.

While oversight of the leased property in D.C. is relatively easy given its proximity to IDA headquarters, the three more distant properties that together make up IDA's Center for Communications and Computing present unique challenges to ensure they have the facilities they need to be successful in their mission.

What is one of your priorities?

One of my priorities is to organize our resources to provide support to Center staff, including researchers, management and operations. In general, I work with the Center leadership to identify areas that provide most value to the staff and the mission.



What are some of your short- and long-term objectives?

Development of a capital plan requires continual assessment of business needs for all locations. We currently have facility condition assessments underway as well as workplace studies at the Center locations. Given IDA's passion for data-driven analysis, I plan to leverage technologies for system and process automation to improve and enable data capture.

I am also working with teams at the Center locations and developers to establish the timeline for many of their facility projects, establish controls for standardizing vendor performance management, and devise a sustainability strategy for the company as a whole and for each individual location.

Earlier this year, Staff Notice 23-01 announced that Conference and Event Services would be realigned within the Corporate Communications Directorate to create efficiencies and better serve staff, sponsors and visitors. The Conference and Event Services team serves as the primary organizer and coordinator for all support services related to complex meetings, conferences, symposiums, receptions or other events. The team is here to assist you with event/meeting planning and coordination, room configurations, catering pick-ups and dropoffs, and galley/pantry supply replenishment. The team's duties include:

- Assessing the needs of the client for clear understanding of event/meeting attendance, purpose, and budget in order to provide recommendations based on the desired outcome.
- Conducting walk-throughs and dry-runs to ensure all needs are executed.
- Serving as the primary contact to internal support departments to coordinate on behalf of the client to ensure that configuration/layouts, maintenance, janitorial, audio/ video, communication, security, networking, catering and related functions are carried out.
- Recommending communication needs, including flyers, posters, signs, handouts and any other supporting material to effectively communicate direction and instruction.
- Overseeing execution of the meeting/event, including supervising set-up, event transitions, catering (delivery and serving) and visitor reception.
- Coordinating tear down, clean up and resetting of all spaces after the meeting/event.

REMINDERS AND UPCOMING EVENTS



Protect yourself and IDA against phishing campaigns. IDA is tightening spam filters to capture more fraudulent emails. One common example of a phishing attempt is an urgent request to pay an invoice. One way to detect email fraud is to look at the email address of the sender. In this case, "Norton A. Schwartz <serviceaccount @example.com>" (or something similar), is likely fraudulent since it did not come from a known address for Norty, such as his @ida.org address. This fraud detection method applies to email not only from "Norton A Schwartz" but also from anyone else who works at IDA. As a reminder, if you receive a suspected fraudulent or suspicious email, send it to phishing@ida.org to have Cyber Security double check. 
